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Descrição do curso

Este curso oferece uma perspectiva geral de algumas teorias desenvolvidas em torno do tema “regimes políticos, democracia e estado de bem-estar” na ciência política contemporânea. A grande maioria dos textos ultrapassam a simples descrição dos problemas, mas tem como tema central o desenvolvimento de desenhos de pesquisa baseados em hipóteses testáveis. O objetivo central desta disciplina é apresentar aos alunos da graduação da disciplina teoria política contemporânea não apenas um tema central da ciência política, mas demonstrar as técnicas de análise de dados aplicadas a uma agenda real de pesquisa empírica.
